#### **Artist Statement**

My work probes our relationship with the natural environment. Through imagery, scientific data, and language I explore multiple ways of knowing and of expressing the world.

In addition to being inspired by physical features of the natural world, my work is informed by reflections on the history of landscape painting and on issues such as extinction and the predicted climate apocalypse.

The title of the exhibition is a quote from the following passage, written by David Benioff and spoken by Brad Pitt's character in the 2004 film *Troy*: "Everything is more beautiful because we're doomed. You will never be lovelier than you are now. We will never be here again."

I have been intrigued by the role of Afrikaans, my mother tongue, in the shaping of my consciousness. Contemplating the theme of loss, I consider how the loss of one's language could extend to the loss of the world.

## **Artist Bio**

Marinta Skupin (b. Williston, South Africa) is a Prebys-endowed scholar and MFA candidate at San Diego State University's School of Art and Design. She has a BA degree in Fine Arts and an MA degree in Arts Administration, both from the University of New Orleans. Prior to returning to the studio full-time, she had a long museum career, most recently as Curator of Education at Laguna Art Museum.

Her work has been exhibited at such venues as the Athenaeum in La Jolla, the Institute of Contemporary Art in San Diego, Gallery 825 in Los Angeles, and the Abercrombie Gallery at McNeese State University in Louisiana.
